The birth of my first grandchild brought to mind the importance of good oral care and the relationship between periodontal disease and possible pregnancy complications.

Study results show that pregnant women with periodontal infection are more likely to have a pregnancy complication than their disease-free counterparts. These obstetric complications may not only affect the mother, but may also result in conditions that affect the wellbeing of the infant

throughout its life. The most commonly seen complications are preterm deliveries and low birth-weight babies. And, while there are always other contributing factors, the presence or absence of periodontal infection clearly influences their rate of incidence.

The key is the periodontal bacteria and the associated systemic inflammatory response. As the bacteria and inflammatory components are circulated in the blood, they may compromise the placental tissue and the normal exchange of nutrients between mother and fetus, thereby increasing the likelihood of a preterm birth and/or a low birth-weight.

It is increasingly important to understand and respect the oral-systemic connection and it's implications for your over-all health.
